| 1–4 | <i>St. Louis Street Car Mail 1892–1915</i> Gary Hendren A look at the routes, markings, and usages of mail on the first street car mail service in the U.S. |
| 5 | <i>We Were All Good Friends in 1909</i> Jerry Jensen The domestic “preferential” rate between the U.S.A. and Germany from the German view. |
| 6–11 | <i>Burma: The Post War Issues of 1945 to 1947</i> Mike Ley A study of the post-war stamps issued for Burma following World War II Japanese Occupation until Burma gained complete independence from Great Britain in 1948. |
| 12 | <i>The Shanghai–Manchouli Flight by Eurasia Aviation Corporation</i> David Lu This one-frame exhibit displays the various first flight covers from each stoppage city, their commemorative circular date stamps, and the airmail surcharge fee due to different sectional calculations. |
