Detours Can Lead to New Areas of Collecting Interest

Almost an Afterthought, a Cover Reveals an Intriguing Niche

One of the habits that has crept into my repertoire of practices for searching through the listings on sites like eBay.com, Delcampe.net, and BidStart.com is to look at the *other* offerings in a seller's store, after I've found at least one item that attracts me. That's the route I took to acquiring this registered air mail cover sent from Mayaguez, Puerto Rico, to Plymouth, Montserrat, on October 3, 1973. The price was right—£0.97 (about \$1.50).

I'd not really paid much attention to any of the issues on this cover. But the unusual combination of locales and the chance to spend a little time decoding the connections between the services—air mail and foreign registry fee—and the payment of \$1.12 attracted me.

A little time with *U.S. International Postal Rates*, 1872–1996, by Anthony S. Wawrukiewicz and Henry W. Beecher, helped me to see that 17¢ paid the first half ounce for air mail between the U.S. Commonwealth of Puerto Rico and Montserrat, in the Caribbean, while the foreign registry fee totaled 95¢. The total? \$1.12! Exactly as paid.

So, now my curiosity was piqued. I began to seek out covers with the Eugene O'Neill \$1 issue from the Prominent Americans Series. I figured that this release might have gotten a good workout on mail that went above and

beyond the typical first-class domestic letter. I've not been disappointed. Another use I found was a registered mail bank tag, sent from Dodgeville to Milwaukee, Wisconsin, on July 14, 1976. This tag is franked with \$11.93, made up by fourteen stamps from the same Prominent Americans Series, including a vertical 2x5 block of ten of the O'Neill stamps.

Figuring out the charges for the services on this item has been a bit of a challenge. Registry Service from April 18 to July 17, 1976, was \$5.50 for the first \$10,000 of the indemnity and then 25¢ for each additional \$1,000. Parcels weighing more than 12 oz. went by Priority Mail in this era. The first five pounds from Dec. 31, 1975, to May 29, 1978, was \$2.83, with each additional pound or fraction costing 30¢, for shipping within 300 miles.

So, if the bank bag had Registry Service for \$22,000, that fee would have been \$8.50. If it weighed between 6 and 7 pounds, the Priority Mail charge would have been \$3.43. This totals \$11.93, which matches the tag. On the other hand, the bag could have weighed between 16 and 17 pounds and been worth only \$10,000. In that case the Registry Service would have been \$5.50 and the Priority Mail would have cost \$6.43, again totaling \$11.93.

Now I'm hooked. I've discovered that the sheet version of the O'Neill stamp was printed in tagged and untagged versions. Plus the USPS printed a coil version. I'm on the lookout for more intriguing covers on this detour!

From the Archives

Obscure Auxiliary Markings Lead to Diverse Explanations

The ex-George Wagner cover to the right has an unusual Minor Letter Dead Letter Office marking not seen before by the local pancake eaters (Club members who gather weekly for a meal and some stamp talk). It was written up first in *Linn's* on April 6, 1987, as one the local post office had advertised, but having it be unclaimed, then sent it on to the dead letter office (DLO) in Washington, where it was opened. The DLO determined the contents had value (usually money), so

the cover was returned to the local post office.

In this first write-up in *Linn's*, the author, Richard B. Graham, cited Sec. 568 of the 1887 PL&R, which defined a minor letter as one addressed to a minor child. This was to signify the local post office should notify the parents of the addressee. This verse of PL&R states that parents may open a child's mail and a husband may open his wife's mail, but the division of the DLO may not open the mail. Note that this cover is addressed to *Mrs.* Mollie Martin.

The author retracted his opinion in a second article in *Linn's* dated October 19, 1987, following several prominent readers' responses that named the "minor letter" as a division of the DLO.

The Minor Letter Division was one of six outlined in the postal laws of 1887, with a function of opening and returning letters having contents of minor value, such as photographs or stamps. The DLO had an Opening Division, which was the only postal entity with the right to open mail addressed to others. They then classified and sent this cover to the Minor Letter Division for handling. Other divisions were the Returning Division for ordinary letters of no value, the Unmailable and Property Divisions for hotel and fictitious letters, the Money Division and the Foreign Division. So much bureaucracy created an interesting and unusual find.
