# "Decoding" Unfamiliar Typographic Characters

# Online Translation Tools Aid in Reading Postal Covers

During the year or so that I've been collecting postally used covers from Tanzania, the standing searches that monitor auctions on eBay.com and delcampe.net occasionally return listings for other items. A registered air-mail cover sent from the former Soviet Union to Tanzania was one of those items.

The Cyrillic characters appearing in the two addresses mostly left me stumped.
Then I had the idea to use Google.com's

translation feature. But how could I get the Cyrillic characters into the "translate" field?



Новосибирек to Мванза: A registered air-mail cover sent from Novosibirsk, Soviet Union, to Mwanza, Tanzania. A legible circular-date stamp receiving postmark from Dar es Salaam on the back of the cover indicates it arrived there on 15 December 1967. A registered mail mark from Mwanza shows the next day's date.

Another minor hurdle. My second idea was to use the keyboard settings on my iMac to change from the U.S. keyboard to the Rus-

sian keyboard. Once I did that, typing the addresses was pretty straightforward. The screenshot to the left shows the first and last lines of the recipient's address (upper left on the cover).

#### TRANSLATION from p. 1

I entered the information for both addresses and learned several interesting items about this cover's journey.

First, a bit about the addressing. The recipient's information appears in the upper left, while the sender's information occupies the lower right portion of the envelope's front.

Second, the information appears with the most local information on top and the most general information on the bottom—the opposite of how American mailing information is organized.

Third, the sender was Vladimir Loginov, P/21, Novosibirsk 15, USSR.

Fourth, the re-

cipient was Devendra Mehta, Mwanza, Tanzania, Africa. So, with a little ingenuity and some software assistance, translating typed addresses using other characters than the typical English letters can work well. This approach shows how to coordinate some freely available software and online services to understand the history of postally used covers.



# USPS Celebrates NASA's Achievement

NEW YORK CITY — Less than a year following NASA's nine-year, three-billion-plus mile *New Horizons* mission to explore Pluto, the U.S. Postal Service dedicated Forever stamps to commemorate the historic event and another set of stamps depicting NASA's stunning images of our planets.

The first-day-of-issue dedication ceremony

for the Pluto—Explored! and Views of Our Planets Forever stamps took place before a crowd of 500 at the world's largest stamp show that only occurs in the United States once a decade, World Stamp Show-NY 2016.

"In 1991, the Postal Service issued a Pluto: Not Yet Explored stamp that served as a rallying cry for those who very much wanted to explore it," said David Williams, U.S. Postal Service Chief Operating Officer and Execu-



Pluto's Brilliant 'Heart': This high-resolution image captured by NASA's New Horizons spacecraft combines blue, red and infrared images taken by the Ralph/Multispectral Visual Imaging Camera (MVIC). Pluto's surface shows a remarkable range of subtle colors, enhanced in this view to a rainbow of pale blues, yellows, oranges, and deep reds. The bright expanse is the western lobe of the "heart," informally known as Tombaugh Regio. The lobe, informally called Sputnik Planum, has been found to be rich in nitrogen, carbon monoxide, and methane ices.

tive Vice President, in dedicating the stamps. "At the time, Pluto was still considered a planet, and it was the only one in our solar system that hadn't been visited by a spacecraft."

Pluto is now officially designated as a dwarf planet. The Postal Service issued the Pluto—Explored! Souvenir sheet as a companion to the pane of Forever stamps depicting "Views of Our Planets."

"In 2006," Williams continued. "NASA placed a 29-cent Pluto: Not Yet Explored stamp on board the *New Horizons* spacecraft, which is safe to say, makes it the most widely-traveled stamp in the universe."

The *New Horizons* spacecraft, launched into space on the fastest rocket ever built, traveled 3.26 billion miles at a speed exceeding 34,000 m.p.h. to reach Pluto on July 14, 2015. In contrast, *Apollo 11* required three days to reach the moon in July 1969. *New Horizons* passed the moon in nine hours on its way to the outer solar system.
