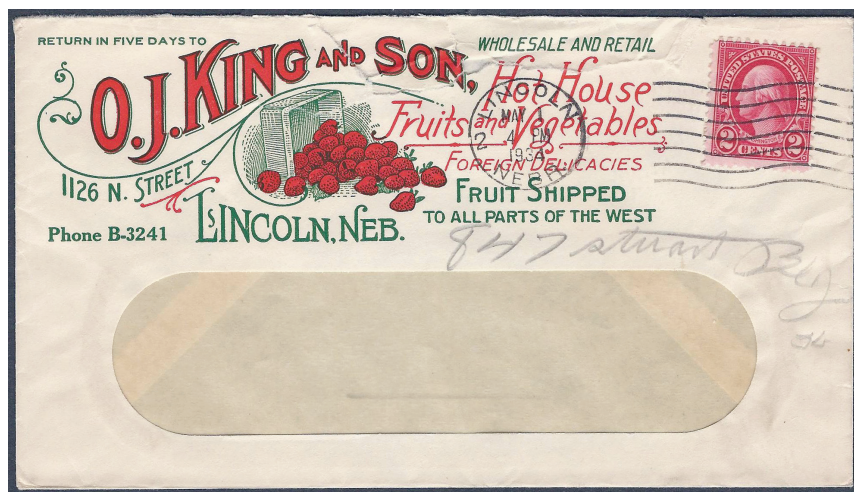
Hometown Postal History—A Limitless Inspiration

Many people collect the postal history of their geographical area. Often this history consists of items and information like postmarks, other markings, and postal rates for different uses. One former member, Alan Anderson, assembled an award-winning exhibit of York, Nebraska, postcards. Another less-often-seen approach would be for a collector to study the businesses, churches, historic buildings, and other items related to his or her community.

Very few collectors seem to prepare illustrated mail exhibits with covers relating to such themes. Part of the reason is that illustrated covers were prepared primarily by large national firms. Most smaller businesses often used little more than return addresses on their envelopes. Hotels, however, were exceptions; their stationery often showed their buildings. The accompanying illustration depicts a nice example of a business envelope from a fruit and vegetable dealer in Lincoln. Now, who was O. J. King and how long was he in business? Here is where the fun begins if you really want to study the business history of a locale.

Often the first approach is to try Google. I met with little success, only learning that Ornan King was the son of William H. King, originally from New York and that he was a grocer. But there are other sources of informa-

tion. I found Ornan King listed in an 1893 Lincoln city directory; he was conducting business at the same address, 1126 N Street, at that time. I have not further searched to find when he began or ended his business. But there are means of uncovering such information. Just ask someone interested in genealogy how they find information.

City directories are good sources of information. The Nebraska State Historical Society has an almost complete file for Lincoln, starting in 1874. Unfortunately, these directories are on microfilm, which makes the search more difficult. Another source would be old newspapers. Surely O.J. King advertised in a Lincoln newspaper. Again, you can find many Nebraska newspapers on microfilm at the Historical Society. But you might also find some online using one of the genealogy search sites. Of course, you have to pay, but when I was studying California agricultural proration stamps, I found more information in this way than I did on two trips to California to study that state's

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holdings in its library and archives.

Such older covers often are not expensive. This one cost me \$2.50, including postage. But they can be hard to find! One could limit such a collection to as large or small an area as one might choose. A real challenge, for instance, would be to find covers from all businesses that have existed on O Street in downtown Lincoln! That topic could keep you searching for years and then spending many more hours to learn the history of the firms you have located.

Whatever focus you choose, you can be sure you will enjoy the searching, the finding, and the learning.

Club Members Share Their Philatelic Work

Several members recently presented the results of their philatelic study in various venues.

Mike Ley received a vermeil award for his exhibit, “Burma: The Issues of the Republic,” at the Omaha Stamp Show, September 10–11, 2016. He also garnered the American Philatelic Congress Award and the India Study Circle Medal for his work.

Dave Hamilton entered his exhibit, “1940 Famous Americans—Heroes of Peace,” at the Omaha Stamp Show, a World Series of Philately exhibition. His entry earned a silver award and several additional citations: the American Association of Philatelic Exhibitors—Gold Award of Honor, the American Association of Philatelic Exhibitors—Novice Award, and the Women Exhibitors Sterling Achievement Award.

Bob Ferguson presented an illustrated talk, “Stamp Images Illustrate U.S. Postal History,” at the Lewis & Clark Interpretive Center, on Sept. 11. He focused on stamps as history, art, and investments made valuable because of errors.

David Frye’s research article, “1961–1973 Air Mail from Tanganyika and Tanzania to Europe: Inferring Rates from a Census of Postal Covers,” has been accepted for publication in two journals. It will appear in *B.E.A.: The Bulletin of the East Africa Study Circle*, September 2016, and *The Postal History Journal*, October 2016.
