April 18:

Our newest member, Erika Wilson, was introduced to the club.

Larry Spreeman showed a 1992 cover that he got from the **John Schultz** collection for the 42nd annual show of the Federation of Iowa Stamp Clubs.

LaVonne Uffleman showed a 1965 cover for the 1st day of opening of the Children's Zoo of Lincoln.

Cynthia Carlson passed around a collection of stamps with fancy cancels in keeping with tonight's program.

Mark Sellhorn showed a 1901 cover franked with Sc. 295 the locomotive from the Pan American Exposition and addressed around the edges of the cover.

The program was a DVD on fancy cancels. The program explained that black, blue, purple and red ink was used for the cancels until 1879 when only black was authorized. We viewed great examples of each of the six basic types of cancel: geometric; wheels & stars; crosses; pictorials; letters & numbers; and mechanical & machine. It certainly was an interesting introduction to a fascinating field of philately.

Registered Letter: Maximiliansau to Fairfield



Maximiliansau, West Germany, to Fairfield, Connecticut, U.S.A.: Various West Germany definitive and commemorative issues, including a souvenir sheet highlighting German Art Nouveau design, paid DM 5.70 for a registered letter sent 12 August 1977. The magenta auxiliary marking on the front and the pair of circular date stamps on the back indicate the letter's detour to Waterbury, Connecticut.

Traditional postal history tends to eschew covers that show evidence of being "philatelic," which means stamp collectors prepared the covers and mailed them—most likely—to other stamp collectors. One of the telltale marks of a philatelic cover is the appearance of a diverse array of stamps. This cover displays such an assembly of stamps. Thus, a postal historian might conclude the cover was "philatelic" and, so, pass on the opportunity to collect and to interpret it. But, to my eye, the cover merits some postal historian's attention because of the additional auxiliary marking: Missent to Waterbury, Conn. The cover's roundabout journey with a detour to Waterbury on its way to Fairfield drew my attention. Someone in the post office in Waterbury realized the cover had been misdirected, noted the error on the front, and, because the cover was treated as registered mail, applied a magenta circular date stamp to the back of the envelope after it had arrived in Waterbury. The destination town, Fairfield, Connecticut, followed suit.
