Don't Judge a Cover by Its Size Tiny Covers Contain Big Stories and Test the Boundaries of Postal Regs

One of the techniques I use when photographing is to look for an unusual or distinctive perspective. It's almost like I tilt my head and squint my eyes to give myself the opportunity to see the mundane in a new and fresh way. About a year or so ago, I had the same experience when I was looking through my collection of postal covers.

While my organization does not fully satisfy me, I've found that, for the most part, filing covers in issue order governed by the predominant stamp makes sense. But then one time I was struck by the variations in size of the covers. Most were the standard $63 / 4$, with some \#10 business envelopes, but a scattering

stood out for their small size.
I began to look for small covers when I was digging through dealer boxes at shows. I've accumulated a nice pile of these tiny covers and discovered they have some intriguing stories to tell and serve as probes testing the boundary conditions of postal regulations.
What will I do with them? I have in the back of my mind to create an exhibit, but I've realized one of the challenges is the number

of pieces I'd need to fill one frame. In most instances, three covers would fit on each page, meaning an exhibit would require 50 percent more items than an exhibit showing "normal" covers! Organizing raises some questions too. Should they be presented in order of the stamps' issuances, of their use, of decreasing surface area, of closest approach to the minimum permissible size for the periods of various regulations, or in categories by type of mail? So many questions for such small covers.

New York to Great Bend: a 2c George Washington stamp from the Fourth Bureau Issue paid only two-thirds of the first-class rate for a letter sent by surface mail. A blurry "Postage due ..." handstamp and a handwritten "Due 1 c " note document the underpayment. At the time this item was mailed, the Empire State Building (below) was the "TALLEST BUILDING in the WORLD."

In the meantime, I'm finding joy in the search for additional items, in figuring out how to organize them, and in tracking down information about the regu-
 lations governing the mailing of small items.

While the particular collection I'm amassing is distinctive, I've discovered that the topic has garnered attention from others. This helps with research. So far I have two items in my clipping file-one thanks to my subscription to Linn's Stamp News and the other thanks to George Wagner, who not only keeps his eye out for small covers for me, but who also gave me an article from his files.

The Wawrukiewicz article notes that before 1963, the U.S. Post Office Department had no stipulated minimum size for first-class letters, although post cards had a minimum size of $2.75^{\prime \prime} \times 4$ ", which was recommended for letters. By this standard, the birth announcement ( $2.875^{\prime \prime} \times 4.25^{\prime \prime}$ ) is just a bit above the minimum and the Empire State Building souvenir $\left(2.75^{\prime \prime} \times 4^{\prime \prime}\right)$ is right at the minimum.
The search continues for smaller items!
