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A History Explores the Life of an Enduring American Institution Book Review: How the Post Office Created America

You may find your philatelic eye drawn to the orderly beauty of album pages neatly displaying postage stamps. Or, perhaps, you find your gaze resting on the always surprising variety that marks postally used covers. Regardless of what kindles your collecting passions, your accumulating, organizing, exploring, and enjoying depend upon the workings of a vast, intricate, and mostly overlooked institution: the post office.

Winnifred Gallagher's history, How the Post Office Created America, turns a researcher's eye and a storyteller's voice to the task of bringing to life the chronicle of the post office's contribution to American history. She makes the case, from the outset, that this history is notable, significant, compelling, and relevant. The Introduction begins by noting,

The history of the post office is nothing less than the story of America. Of the nation's founding institutions, it is the lease appreciated or studied, and yet for a very long time it was the U.S. government's major endeavor. Indeed, it was that government in the experience of most citizens. As radical an experiment as America itself, the post was the incubator of our uniquely lively, disputatious culture of innovative ideas and uncensored opinions. With astonishing speed, it established the United States as the world information and communications superpower.
The book's sixteen chapters cover the history of the post from the work of Benjamin Franklin through the decades of the country's expansion to our modern era in which digital communications technologies challenge the financial viability of this venerable institution. A center-of-the-book collection of plates illustrates that history, depicting subjects as diverse as Star Route sled dogs, RFD mail


Filling a Gap: Winifred Gallagher's history of the U.S. Post Office and its role in American culture tells an overlooked story. trucks weighing babies to support public health, Chicago's first female mail carrier, and a rocket mail cover.
In "Notes," a phrase-based compendium of endnotes gives detailed bibliographic sources. "Suggested Readings" lists both print and digital sources for further exploration.

## Nebraska

Sesquicentennial Stamp to Feature Sandhill Cranes


This Nebraska Statehood stamp in the Statehood series celebrates the state's 150th anniversary. Known for agriculture, the Cornhusker State became the thirty-seventh state on March 1, 1867.
Nebraska photographer Michael Forsberg set up among prairie grasses along the Platte River between Grand Island and Kearney to capture the image shown on the stamp. In the photograph, sandhill cranes fly low to scout for shelter from nighttime predators. This mid-migratory rest for half a million birds along the Platte River is unique to Nebraska.

Forsberg captured this image as winter thawed into spring around the year 2000. Art director Derry Noyes designed the stamp using Forsberg's existing photograph. Forsberg is the author and photographer of On Ancient Wings: The Sandhill Cranes of North America.

## Following the "Yellow Brick Road" of Collecting Interests

Readers of The Souvenir Sheet for the past two years cannot help but notice my mission-trip-sparked interest in Tanzania's stamps and postal history, explored in articles and programs.

So, what is the story with this cover from Uganda? The answer to that question shows how one's evergrowing collecting interests can meander, branch, and lead one off in surprising directions. You


Ganga, Uganda, to New York, New York: An air mail letter sent 12 May 1966, despite its bilingual air mail etiquette label, was noted for its underpayment of the prevailing TZS 2/50 air-mail rate to North America, marked with the encircled "T", and sent by surface mail. probably have a similar story to tell.
Before its independence, Tanganyika was a British territory participating in a postal administration run jointly on behalf of the territories in British East Africa: Kenya, Uganda, and Tanganyika. With territorial independence, the postal administration became the East African Posts and Telecommunications Corporation (EAPTC).
During the 1960s, this entity issued stamps bearing the names of all three countries. They were "good" for postage for mail originating anywhere within any of the three countries. One of those stamps appears on this cover; the $50 \$$ Tourism issue, released 4 April 1966, depicts Murchison Falls. So, this stamp is Tanzania connection number one.
The two definitive stamps are part of Uganda's 9 October 1965 Birds definitive series. The $20 \$$ issue shows a single Narina Trogon, and the horizontal $30 \$$ issue presents
a Sacred Ibis. The Stanley Gibbons Commonwealth Stamp Catalogue: East Africa with Egypt \& Sudan provides stamp issue details. It turns out that both of these issues feature the artwork of Rena Fennessy. Primarily an artist of East Africa's wildlife and scenery, she created the art for most of the post-independence definitives released by all three EAPTC countries over their first twenty-five years or so. Thus, her work appears in Kenya's definitive issues showing wildlife (1966), seashells (1971), minerals (1977), flowers (1983), and butterflies (1988) and in Uganda’s definitive issues highlighting birds (1965), flowers (1969), and crops (1975). Her wildlife artwork also provided Tanzania's definitive stamps with images of fish (1967), butterflies (1973), and wildlife (1980). So, the artist, Rena Fennessy, is Tanzania connection number two.

You never know where the yellow brick road will lead!
