Gwanda to Sacramento: Censored and Underpaid

This cover traversed a great distance during wartime, making its way from Gwanda, Rhodesia, now Zimbabwe. One auxiliary markings documents the letter's successful passage through a a U.S. c ensor's screening. The envelope shows no sign of having been opened and resealed.

Note that the postage—
not all of which remains on the cover—short paid the surface mail rate. The New York Post
Office marked the letter postage due by 4¢. The two stamps remaining on the cover

paid 11/2d, where "d" was the denominational notation for pence, the plural of penny. This was the basic unit of the British currency system. Southern Rhodesia was a British colony in this period, which explains the visage of King George VI (11 December 1936–6 February 1952) on the stamps. The blue crayon notation, "T30," was overwritten with a pencil to say "T20."

The always-helpful U.S. International Postal Rates, 1872–1996, researched and written by Anthony W. Wawrukiewicz and Henry W. Beecher, includes a "Table showing rates/fees on incoming surface mail to United States, 1879–1950" (pp. 260–294). The entries for Southern Rhodesia (p. 287) notes that a rate of 3d for the first weight increment was in effect from 6 June 1932 to 24 July 1950.

It appears that the "T30" postage-due notation was applied when the envelope bore only the stamps that still remain on it. Thus, 11/2d was short of 3d by 11/2d. At the exchange rate of 20 centimes per British



Gwanda, Southern Rhodesia, to Sacramento, California: Two Southern Rhodesia King George VI (KGVI) definitive stamps with denominations 1/2d and 1d, totaling 11/2d, and one missing stamp, which occupied the rectangular space straddling the left and middle circular date stamps, underpaid the prevailing surface mail rate to North America. The postmark, Proud Type 2C, carries the date of "19 FEB 1940," which places the mailing during World War II. That, in turn, explains the purple "PASSED BY CENSOR" auxiliary marking that was applied, most probably, at the New York Post Office, where the "DUE 4 CENTS" notation was made.

penny, the letter was marked underpaid by 30 centimes $(20 \times 11/2)$. But that was not the end of the story. The penciled correction to the blue crayon notation changed the short-paid note to "T20." At the exchange rate in the United States of 5¢ per centime, the postage due was 4¢ (20/5).

My guess is that the sender had franked the letter with the full 3d, perhaps using a brown 11/2d KGVI definitive. That stamp fell off after the letter had been mailed and the stamps cancelled. Then, someone along

the way noted the stamp was missing and made the "T30" note. Next, in the U.S., a p ostal employee saw the gap in the cancellations and, deciding that some stamp had been in place initially, marked down the amount due to "T20."
