Still no physical meetings, but we held a virtual meeting on Zoom with 12 members attending from Lincoln, Omaha, Franklin (Mass.) and Henderson (Nevada). The program on collecting tips went well with lively discussion by everyone. We talked about 1) the different types of collecting (mint vs used; plate blocks; sheets; topicals; covers, etc.); 2) dealing with dealers both in person and online; 3) protecting your collections with insurance and safekeeping; and 4) disposing of your collections through sale, inheiretance, or donation.

Our meeting place has decided to wait another month before allowing groups to meet. Again, our next meeting on August 20 will be on Zoom. We will advise everyone as soon as possible about resuming physical meetings.

Joel Johnson showed a 1977 LINPEX cover cacheted with a picture of the Cooper Nuclear plant in Brownville.

David Arunski showed several of the 1869 pictorials recently added to his collection and an 1859 cut square franked with a variety of the 1857 three cent Washington.

David Frye showed a 1987 cover found in a dollar box that was mailed from Malawi to the Vatican and forwarded to Assisi, Italy. David explained the history and postal markings on the cover.

Mark Sellhorn showed a 1943 censored cover from Colorado to Pitcairn Island.

As we move closer to having in-person meetings, here is a reminder of the scavenger hunt items for the first get-together (hopefully in August):

- * Find a stamp beginning with letters A to Z for each category of a person, place, and thing/event.
- * The person, place, and thing/event must be pictured on the stamp.

Hanwell to Lambertville: Postage-due Surface Mail

This cover sports a young Queen Elizabeth II definitive from the pre-decimal Wilding series. Denominated 4d, where "d" is the symbol for penny (plural "pence"), the stamp underpaid the prevailing 6d surface letter rate for the first weight unit by 2d.

According to a "Table showing rates/fees on incoming surface/ airmail to United States, 1950–1971" (pp. 295–315) in U.S.

International Postal Rates, 1872


–1996, researched and written by Anthony W. Wawrukiewicz and Henry W.

Beecher, the 6d rate for this weight and class was in effect from 1 October 1957 to 2 October 1966 (p. 301).

The Foreign Section (F.S.) of the British postal system marked the letter as short-paid with a common hexagon surrounded "T" and "14c", standing for

taxe and 14 centimes, following the Universal Postal Union conventions for noting postage due on mail.

The magenta auxiliary marking from the New York General Post Office indicates 5ϕ postage due, which the 5ϕ postage-due stamp canceled in Lambertville on ? Jan 1966 covered. At the time, 1ϕ equaled 3c. Thus, $14c/[3c/\phi]$, or 4.33ϕ , was rounded up to 5ϕ .

One intriguing question remains: what was the conversion rate for British pence (d) and French centimes (c) in 1965? Reviewing another cover can help. The second cover depicted here, franked with a 3d stamp, was marked 21c postage due. Given it also traveled by surface mail to the United States in the same rate period, the relation of 1d per 7c can be confirmed.

Finally, these two covers provide evidence to illustrate that the General Post Office in New York handled a sufficient number of letters short-paid by both 5ϕ and 7ϕ to merit the production of distinct handstamps for each amount. Neither the typography of the handstamps nor the forms of the abbreviation for "Section were standardized.
