Club Happenings Last Month

January 13 Meeting

We met with 16 members attending. LaVonne talked about LINPEX 2022 on February 26-27at the Country Inn and Suites and discussed the necessary tasks to be done asking for volunteers. Currently, we have 6 exhibits lined up in 8 frames. This is a good time to think about doing an exhibit. We want to fill 20 frames and everyone is welcome to enter.

Dale Niebuhr showed a 1c postal card mailed 11/2/1936 in Chicago announcing a meeting for election of officers for the Communist Party.

Brad Shay passed around a booklet containing the stamp and biography of each of the 35 Famous Americans. He also talked about 6 of our club members helping the Pathfinder kids at the church earn stamp collecting honors (similar to Boy Scout badges). In that process, **Brenda and Maya** Ladig joined our club. Welcome Benda and Maya.

Mark Sellhorn showed a Christmas present of a 1930 picture postcard of the Graf Zeppelin and its commander Hugo Ekener franked with the 65c zeppelin (Sc. C13).

Mark also showed a "Postage Stamp" quilt that his wife made for donation to the club. It will be raffled off at LINPEX 2022.



Program :"Sorting 1 cent Washington/Franklin Greens" By Dave Hamilton

Dave passed out piles of 1 cent green Washington/Franklin stamps to each person along with a guide to sorting them out. He walked us through the steps of first sorting the stamps into 5 piles explaining the difference in each. **Dave** then passed out watermarking trays with fluid and helped many of our members with the fine art of finding (quite often) difficult watermarks. We all learned quite a bit and walked away with a useful guide to identify the green Washington/Franklins in our own collections.

Step 1 is to sort into 5 piles

Sorting Pile 2 is rather easy; all are perf 12 and DL wmk except for the imperf, 314, which has no wmk.

A coil has straight edges on opposing sides and a booklet never does. A booklet can have a single straight edge or two but if two, they are on adjacent sides. Keep in mind that a flat press sheet of stamps has natural straight edges on two sides of the sheet (usually 19 out of 100 for definitive issues). You really cannot identify a booklet stamp from the top or middle rows without having both positions attached to each other.

In 1908 flat plate stamps were made into coils from private perforation companies and their affixing machines. See this area of Scott's catalog for details on this area. Make sure you save any with different types of private perfs.

Beware of sheet stamps that have had their perforations trimmed to look like coils or imperf stamps. Also, note at some time in stamp collecting history, straight edge stamps were valued much less resulting in people reperforating these to enhance their value to collectors.

Sorting pile 3 is also rather straight forward from what you now know. You can easily see the difference between the perf 12 and the later perf 8 ½. What skill is new came in 1910 when DL watermark 191 was replaced with SL watermark 190 thinking that the paper was being weakened and shrinking due to the watermark.

The blue paper stamp has instead of blue and grey paper that is difficult at times to sort from dirty. A blue paper should be examined under a microscope for the fibers. These stamps had paper which instead of all wood pulp had 35% rag content giving the paper the grey coloration and longer bluish fibers. The standard way of looking at these is with a

Sorting pile 4 requires us to learn to use a perf gauge. Perfs are measured in their count in a range of 2 cm. and after you examine quite a few you will be able to count the number of full perfs on the short edge of these stamps and get it without the guage. Experienced collectors develop an eye so they can usually see the differences without counting. In this group we also need to watermark most of our choices and note the group of stamps with compound perfs were the horizontal measure (first number) is different than the vertical edges.

We need 1 more skill, that ability to tell flat plate from offset and from rotary printing. Mark reprinted an article in our last newsletter on this subject to which I will defer. I still think the best tool is to mount known flat and rotary stamps on a card (next page).

Offset printing of postage stamps was done during WW1 in the years 1918-1920 due to shortages of ink, plates, and manpower. It wasn't used again in 1964. These stamps usually have a duller appearance than the rest which are all engraved.
