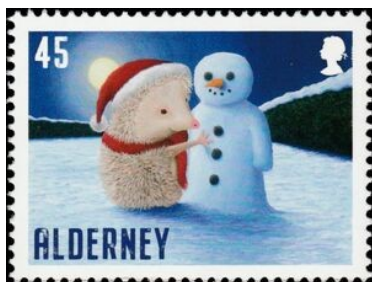
Mark Sellhorn showed a small group of early 1900's Thanksgiving postcards

Irish and British World War II Censors Check Civilian Mail

During times of war, countries have monitored civilian postal communications to assure that information that could be employed to reduce national security does not pass through the mails unimpeded. The cover pictured here shows censor labels applied by the governments of the sender's country—Ireland—and its pass-through country—Great Britain. These labels are pink and cream, respectively.

One researcher on Irish mail censorship during World War II notes, "Censorship of communications, including mail, was established on 3rd Sept 1939 under the EMERGENCY POWERS ORDER, 1939, following Éamon de Valéra's (Irish Prime Minister's) neutrality address to Dáil Éireann (Irish Parliament) on 2nd Sept., in which he said, 'It is necessary at every step to protect our own interests in that regard, to avoid giving to any of the belligerents any due cause, any proper cause,

Muineachán, Ireland, to Newark, New Jersey: The postmark uses the Gaelic rendering of Monaghan to note the town of origin of this doubly censored civilian letter. The date of mailing was 19 VI 40 or 19 June 1940. The blue French-Gaelic etiquette marked the piece air mail.

of complaint."¹

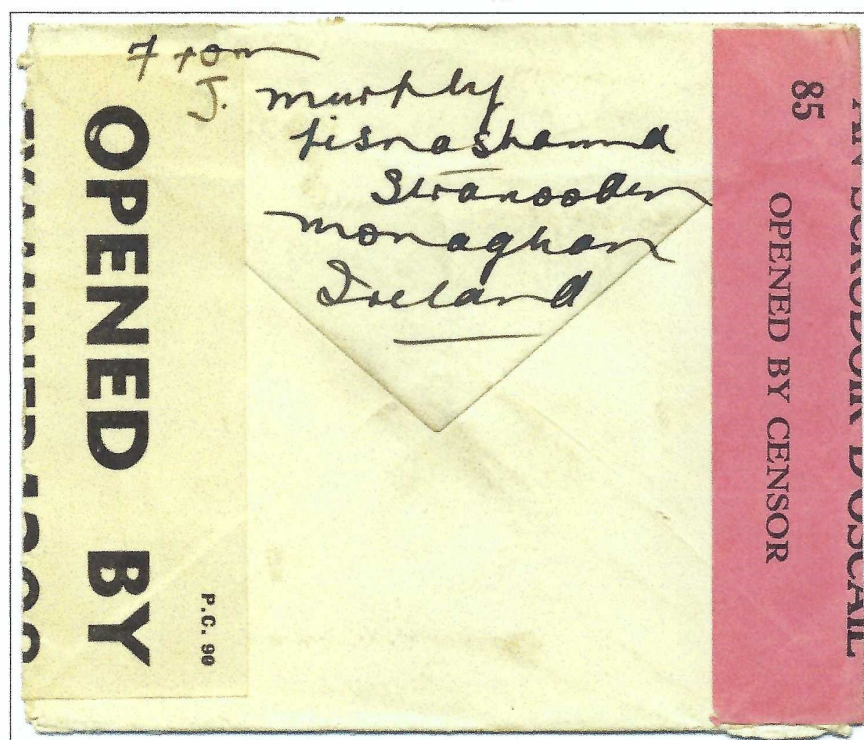
Ireland's pink label, classified as a Type-II S.P.1. label,² includes this

bilingual text: S.P.1. / AN SCRÚDÓIR D'OSCAIL / 85 / OPENED BY CENSOR.

The British label, affixed to the envelope's right edge, states: P.C. 90 / OPENED BY EXAMINER 1208. It is worth noting that the British censor rewrote the portion of the sender's address that the label had covered.
