WHAT DO YOU COLLECT?



This is a common question to a stamp collector. And is what a dealer at a show will first ask. This makes me think of the numerous methods that exist to enjoy our hobby of Stamp Collecting.

U.S. or Foreign, Mint or Used. This gives a general answer but there is so much more. Here is one to think about.

What about stamps of a specific holiday? With the Christmas holiday coming up there are loads of Christmas options.

The first U.S. Christmas stamps were issued in 1962. There had been high demand for a Christmas stamp for years. Previously people had been mailing cards via 3rd-Class mail, which saved them 1– 1 1/2 cents from the First-Class mail. But with using the 3rd-Class mail cards could not have any personal information included and envelopes had to be left unsealed. The 3rd-Class did not automatically return to sender so many cards were destroyed. The Post Office benefitted with increased revenue by encouraging people to spend more for the First-Class rate. This first Christmas stamp set sales record of nearly 862 million. Printed by the Bureau of Engraving and Printing and all the stamps were distributed by Dec. 5, 1962. Christmas issues have occurred every year since 1962, except for the year 2000. None were printed for 2000 because of excess stamps from 1999.



In November 1970, the Postal Service first issued dual Christmas stamps - a “traditional” stamp with a religious theme and a “contemporary” stamp with a secular theme. Each were also printed as pre-cancels.

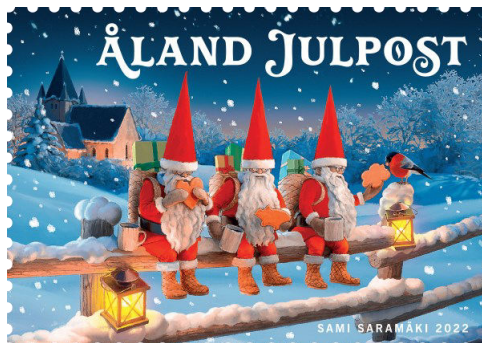
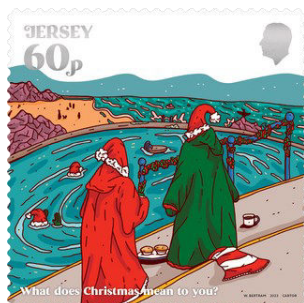


In 1974, three Christmas stamps were issued, one being the first Self-Adhesive stamp.



There are many Christmas stamps from other countries as well.

Some people even specialize in Christmas themes, Santa Claus, manger scenes, winter scenes, Christmas trees or stars, the 3 wise men or decorations. Anything associated with the holiday is a possible theme.
